

Dear Friends.

Haiti is in crisis. It has been difficult for everybody there. From here we can't do too much but prayers go a long way. I have never in my life been afraid to go to Haiti. I have always said that Haiti is my home. I am not afraid to go, but if something should happen to me, it's because my time is up. When God makes you he takes you from wherever you are.

Last July I needed to visit my godmother in Haiti. She got COVID and then had a stroke. Half of her body was paralyzed. Making the decision to go was difficult but it was something I felt I had to do. My sister did not want me to go. Other members of my family did not want me to go. I told very few people because I was endangering myself and my family members in Haiti if the gangs found out someone was coming from the United States. They make money from kidnapping. The way things are now, gangs are everywhere. They are in Port au Prince and Petionville and spreading to other parts of Haiti. They are kidnapping every single day.

I was there for five days. It was difficult for me to not only see my godmother suffering but also to see my country in disarray. We really couldn't go anywhere. I couldn't sleep because of gunshots all night long. In my mind I'm thinking how can they live like that every single day. In Haiti family and friends have their phones linked together with a GPS system because they want to know where everyone is at all times. If someone is kidnapped others can get to the location right away. Three physicians were kidnapped while I was there.

The troubles are spreading. People now are moving to other little towns, including Mirebalais where we do much of our work. Fr. Alphonse and Fr. Romel, our partners in Mirebalais, tell us people are coming there from Port au Prince. It's very challenging for the priests. They have people coming to them every day, crying to them.

So things are very quickly also getting bad in Mirebalais. Those who have been to Haiti know how many motorcycles there were in Mirebalais and how many cars and trucks and all the horns honking. Fr. Alphonse said there were no motorcycles or cars in town because there is little gas and if you go to the black market the cost is now more than \$50 a gallon. In September the government had announced an end to gas subsidies - causing a big gang in Port-au-Prince to take over the depot where all of the fuel is stored and they will not let any out.

For a time even the road from Mirebalais to Port au Prince was blocked so that travel back and forth was stopped. For a couple days there were issues getting money from the banks in Port au Prince to the banks in Mirebalais. So staff in our medical/dental clinic couldn't get paid for a time. Finally the road was cleared so the bank trucks could make it through.

The church in Haiti is a very powerful force and sometimes is the only thing that functions. Réfugiés will go to the priests for anything and everything. The children who come to Mirebalais with their families want to go to school. Before the end of the last school year the priests took in additional children. The challenges to open school this year are many. They were supposed to open October 3. But that day the entrance to the school was fire bombed.

The hospital in Mirebalais that Paul farmer helped to build has solar power and a water purification system. It might be the only hospital in Haiti that is functioning fairly well. Other hospitals in Haiti need diesel fuel to power their generators so it's very challenging for them to stay open. That's another reason why people are coming to places like Mirebalais because there are still some services available.

Our clinic is doing a wonderful job. It is open five days a week as long as there is no trouble in town. If something happens they close down but otherwise we have two physicians; a family practitioner and a pediatrician. We have a dentist, lab techs, an archivist and other personnel. Fr. Alphonse has a family living on the roof of the clinic now (where he had built rooms for teachers to stay overnight) because they have no place to go. And even choosing families to help is an issue.



Father Romel at the Catholic Church had people coming every day. HOM recently provided money to support parishioners with food and to help them start businesses. A few weeks ago someone came and asked him for food and he had to tell them it was already all distributed. Some people began to say that he did have food but did not want to give it out - so there was a riot. They tried to break into his place looking for food.

Gangs are killing many people. Two journalists were killed recently. People are dying because they get caught between gangs when they are shooting at each other. The only thing I can think of is that we cannot stop praying for Haiti and we cannot stop helping them. So we continue to ask for your prayers and are hopeful that Haiti will see better days ahead.

St.Pierre Clinic

In 2021 the generator had a major repair and had other problems on the horizon so the HOM Executive Committee agreed to replace it. In January 2022 HOM sent funds for a new generator, for materials to maintain it and for a new compressor for the dental clinic. Fr. Alphonse was able to buy them and have them delivered to the clinic. In addition, HOM provided the funds to paint the exterior and interior of the clinic.














St. Louis Water System

Since 2019 Culligan has performed the periodic routine maintenance required by the water purification system as well as making bigger repairs. This has been a lifeline for the system because HOM members have not been able to travel to Mirebalais and evaluate or work on the system for several years. During the past year Culligan has replaced a UV lamp (that disinfects the water), water filters, a pump and motor. HOM contributions paid for more than 90% of the cost of this maintenance. Vivaldie, who works for Hands and Hearts with Haiti, has coordinated this work for Fr. Romel.





Fr. Romel expressed interest in solar power because electricity is not reliably supplied by the power company and gasoline and diesel fuel are very expensive, if available at all. The amount of sunlight in Haiti makes solar systems viable alternative. The ideal project would provide for all the power needed at the specific site and a Haitian company would provide support similar to that for the water system. The initial cost of a solar systems is very high so HOM may seek partners in any project it undertakes.



When Haiti Outreach Mission wire transfers support to Mirebalais Haiti' we ask Fr. Romel and Fr. Alphonse to let us know when they receive funds at the bank. The edited email exchange below is a glimpse of HOM's support and the work and life of the priests in Haiti, including a kidnapping.

Dear Fr. Romel.

Did I not see your response to our wire transfer of \$3,000 for Humanitarian aid and funds for Priest Discretionary use of \$1,000 and Christmas gift to you of \$250 (email sent to you by me Jan. 12, 2022)?

Better COVID news here in Michigan. The number of deaths are finally decreasing! Sincerely.

(Feb 8 2022 8:30 pm)

Dear Bill! I apologize because I had too much for myself at the end of last year and the beginning of this new year. One of my sisters was sick and was at the hospital for surgery. She was operated on twice in eight days. When I saw your email, I went to the bank and on seeing the wire I made the plan to answer your email, but it seems that I didn't do it. However, in my mind I did it. Sorry!

I received the money you sent for humanitarian, for priest discretionary and the gift you sent me. Thank you. In total, I received: \$4280. The bank took \$36.70 for fees and the remainder was: \$4243.30.

The \$3000 gave 270 000 Gourdes. With this money I helped 4 people into the parish who are trying to build their little houses. I supported 2 students for private university scholarships. I supported 14 vulnerable people in need. I helped 4 families in need. I gave money to a group of the parish to welcome people from 4 parishes in the neighborhood who came for night prayer on February 1st. I paid for a rental house for a lady from the parish. I bought 40 bags of rice and 20 cases of spaghetti for distribution. With the \$1000 for priest discretionary I paid for electricity repair at the church and I allowed \$500 for the building of the chapel of Boyer. I will save my gift of \$243.30 for purchasing my ticket for summer vacation if Covid allows me to travel.

Thank you so much for this humanitarian action. God will reward you. Thank you for accepting to pay \$1650 for the repair of the clean water system.

I am glad for the good news about Covid in Michigan.

Have a good night.

Pray for me. I have one of my best friends who had been kidnapped by the gangs in Port-au-Prince since Saturday and we do not have much news. Pray for Him. His name is Dionny Justime. He used to help me a lot in my mission. He was always responsible to me and the parish.

How are you? Thank you for your prayers. Last night at 1 AM, Diony Justimé, my friend who was kidnapped escaped from the hands of the kidnappers. He rushed to a hospital because they beat him a lot and the kidnappers were chasing him to the hospital. Fortunately, I found someone who picked him up and took him to Mirebalais.

Hi Bill. We had this End of the year 2021 a big issue with our clean water system. Culligan came and made the repairs by changing the items you can see on the invoice. Usually DLO Saint Louis Paid all the repairs and maintenance but not this big invoice. Is there any way HOM could help us pay this amount? The money the system has can be evaluated at about \$ US 500. Can HOM help us? If not the system will stop working for a long time.

Thank you for helping us keep working this system that is one of the best and the cheapest for the people in Mirebalais.

Dear Bill and Valerie!

How are you? Here we are doing well! During the war of the gangs in Port au Prince that still makes people fear and where people are dving day after day, we keep receiving people in Mirebalais. I received the money HOM sent me to support some of them. However it was very difficult for me because of the quantity of people in need and who asked for support. I took time to choose the more vulnerable. Finally, at the end of June I made the decision to pay rent for 5 families and I gave money to 6 families who are welcoming other families from Croix-des-Bouquets to support them. Now I am having great concern with a large family I am supporting. This family is a murge family with 3 heads. One head with 4 people, another one with 4 people and the third one with 6 people. That gives a total of 14 people. I give them some money from time to time but I cannot keep it. I took their kids to my schools. I am looking for tuition for them. I am trying to see how I can give them some money for little businesses. The husband of one family wants to raise chickens as a business. I am wondering how HOM could help me with this large family for renting, for tuition, for business and for chicken coop. I would like to make them independent. I have a lot of requests. Help me to take them case by case.

The situation is chaotic in Haiti. People are coming to the rectory to ask me as a priest to help them. It is a great suffering when I see the need for these people who are forced to leave their homes and sometimes even their jobs in Port au Prince and that I cannot help them. Please help me to open some doors for them.

Zoom Meeting with Hands and Hearts with Haiti, Wednesday July 20

HOM and HHH have known of each other for years. Leaders of each organization happened to be visiting St. Louis rectory in Mirebalais at the same time several years ago while Fr. Leveque was pastor.

This first Zoom meeting of the leadership of our two Missions was spent getting to know each other and the work we do, including how we might help each other. Actually, HHH had already helped us, beginning in 2016. Golds Mithe Joseph, their Community Development Manager, translated for us and in the following years helped manage our mobile medical/dental work during our Mission. (see HOM Newsletter Ten 2016 page 6, available on our website https://haitioutreachmission.org).

A common problem both groups have is not being able to ship goods to Haiti for the last few years. When the current crisis goes away, perhaps we can ship together. Before the current troubles, HOM traveled to Haiti twice a year and visited with our partner priests. While not traveling quite as often, HHH has always hired Haitians to administer their Mission work, taking some of that burden off the priests.

HHH did not know that HOM built and developed the water purification system at the orphanage, now the St. Louis Msgr. Remy Augustin School.

HHH has focused their efforts on St. Louis Chapel / Mission Churches. These are generally less developed churches in villages some distance from Mirebalais and in this case served by the pastor of St. Louis.

Over the years HOM has done a number of mobile medical and dental clinics at Our Lady of Deliverance Church / School in Noyau, and Ecole Presbyteral N.D. D'Altagrace (Our Lady of Grace) in Desvarrieux. HHH has also done good works in these villages. For example, in Noyau they partnered with Food for the Poor and built a grade school that opened in 2019. They have also helped to support Msgr. Remy Augustin School, the former St. Blasé orphanage.

Hearts and Hands with Haiti also supports a goat business program at each chapel. In return for receiving 3 goats families agree to attend education classes about goat care. They pay back the program in goat offspring/money which is used to pay vet fees. Families get income and expand the program. There is a chairperson to coordinate the local program and there is a vet tech that checks the health of the goats on a regular basis. HHH supports a Community Development Manager (formerly Golds Mithe Joseph, now Vivaldie) to report on all goat programs and the other programs HHH supports.
